



LABYRINTH RESTORATION

Back in 2009, St. Mark's had a sizable youth group which was looking for a service project. Under the leadership of their adviser, retired high school teacher Joeine Green, they decided to build a labyrinth on the north side of the campus. It was a huge project, but was finally finished in 2011. Over the years since, the numbers of high school students attending St. Mark's diminished to a handful, and St. Mark's Youth Group ceased to exist. As a result, the labyrinth became overgrown with weeds and unusable.




The view from the center of the labyrinth, looking south towards the Iskashitaa Garden

ISKASHITAA UPDATED NEEDS



What is happening?

Due to the urgent food insecurity challenges refugees in Arizona will face as the H.R.1 law takes effect, Iskashitaa would like to shift to collecting all food donations now. We estimate that at least 25,000 refugees who have arrived in the last five years still ineligible for citizenship are at risk of losing access to all SNAP benefits, their primary lifeline for healthy food.

As food prices climb, housing remains unaffordable, and resettlement agency resources are cut, Our programs are already seeing record demand. We are mobilizing local food producers and hunger partners to help us mitigate the harm these changes will likely cause.

How can you help?

Food Pantry Ask:

- Bags of yellow or white onions, potatoes, apples
- Cans of tuna, tomatoes (any), beans
- Cooking oil

Dry Goods:

• Sugar

- Beans
- Flour (all purpose)
- Lentils
- White corn flour
- Pasta

Other ways to help:

Please also consider purchasing gift card from Fry's or Walmart (thinking these store cards would go further at these stores than Albertson or Safeway)

You can also support us every time you shop at Fry's if you link your community rewards to Iskashitaa Refugee Network EP944 to your Fry's VIP card.

Do you frequent Market on the Move or Produce on Wheels helping to slow food loss? Consider purchasing an extra share, then bring it to the Iskashitaa Office on Monday.

Is your family or civic group planning on picking apples at Apple Annies this fall? If so, consider picking an extra basket for a refugee family then bring it to the Iskashitaa Office on Monday.

Iskashitaa Refugee Network is forever grateful for the support you have shown to the Refugee Community. The St. Mark's congregation has donated 1529 pounds of food staples, (325 pounds of shampoo, laundry and dish soap) since our Staple Food drive began 2/23/25.

WORSHIP AND OUTREACH

Worship and Outreach Part 1- The "Bad" News

Recent <u>Gallup polls</u> indicated that three in ten Americans attend religious services every week (21%) or almost every week (9%). 11% report attending about once a month. 25% "seldom" and 31% "never" attend. Two decades ago, an average of 42% of U.S. adults attended religious services every week or nearly every week. A decade ago, the figure fell to 38%, and it is currently at 30%. This decline is largely driven by the increase in the percentage of <u>Americans with no religious affiliation</u> -- 9% in 2000-2003 versus 21% in 2021-2023 -- almost all of whom do not attend services regularly. Jim Palmer, a former mega-church pastor and present progressive theologian, reflected that:

"Christianity, the largest religion in the United States, experienced a 20th century high of 91% of the total population in 1976. This declined to 73.7%

by 2016 and 64% in 2024. Religious "Nones" (the religiously unaffiliated) are now the largest single group in the U.S. at 28% of the population. Generation Z (born between 1999 and 2015) is the nation's least religious generation. They are far more likely to identify as atheist or agnostic."

Palmer presents various reasons why people leave religion:

- People's ideological progressivism is increasing faster than faith communities' approaches to faith are.
- Some people leave because of trauma, abuse, intellectual reasons, or outgrowing their faith. A recent study indicates that 1 in 3 Americans suffer religious trauma, which occurs when a person's religious experiences are emotionally, psychologically or spiritually harmful or abusive. People cannot endorse the values of their previous religious organization, including their views on LGBTQ+ individuals, stances on gender or sexuality, or pervasive sexism and racism.
- Some people no longer identify as religious because they find labels problematic. Take the term, "Christian": are we talking about a far-right, fundamentalist Christian Nationalist "Christian", or a progressive, social justice, DEI "Christian"?

There does, however, seem to be a common underlying feature in why people leave religion: **cognitive dissonance**. Cognitive dissonance theory posits that individuals seek to maintain consistency among multiple cognitions (e.g., thoughts, behaviors, attitudes, values, or beliefs). Inconsistent or antithetical cognitions produce inner distress that motivates individuals to change one or more cognitions to achieve consonance. For many people, leaving religion and changing their beliefs is an effort to alleviate cognitive dissonance, and achieve consonance (a state of harmony and alignment between one's beliefs, thoughts, feelings, and actions).

The Church in the US has been facing a decline of interest and relevancy due to negative responses to actions taken in the name of their faith, disillusionment, negative advertisement, generational values change, and a failure to address cognitive dissonance in theology and practice.

It would be easy to shrug our shoulders and raise our hands and throw in the ministry towel, so to speak. But we can be encouraged by the fact that St. Mark's is aware of these changes, and does not ignore social justice issues as separate from spiritual practice. We are more in line with creating cognitive consonance. In Part 2 of this article, I will attempt to make clearer how our worship affects our outreach.
