SECOND SCRIPTURE READING

For, as I can testify, they voluntarily gave according to their means, and even beyond their means, begging us earnestly for the privilege of sharing in this ministry to the saints— and this, not merely as we expected; they gave themselves first to the Lord and, by the will of God, to us, so that we might urge Titus that, as he had already made a beginning, so he should also complete this generous undertaking among you.

Now as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in utmost eagerness, and in our love for you—so we want you to excel also in this generous undertaking. I do not say this as a command, but I am testing the genuineness of your love against the earnestness of others. For you know the generous act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich. And in this matter I am giving my advice: it is appropriate for you who began last year not only to do something but even to desire to do something— now finish doing it, so that your eagerness may be matched by completing it according to your means. For if the eagerness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has—not according to what one does not have. I do not mean that there should be relief for others and pressure on you, but it is a question of a fair balance between your present abundance and their need, so that their abundance may be for your need, in order that there may be a fair balance. As it is written, "The one who had much did not have too much, and the one who had little did not have too little."

We will have places to plug in crockpots, and refrigerators and ovens will be available to keep food warm or cold in the Geneva kitchen.


FOOD & HYGIENE PANTRY: Our food pantry helps many people in our community, especially during these troubled times. Many thanks to everyone who brought much needed items for the food & hygiene pantry. These are our current needs for the food pantry: canned goods: Spam, Vienna sausages, plain beans, non-starchy vegetables, pasta sauce (no glass jars, please), soup (no cream soups, please), canned or vacuum-packed chicken, ready to heat and eat meals such as Spaghetti-Os, Chef Boyardee, and Kraft macaroni and cheese. (Please, no boxed meals that require additional ingredients to prepare such as milk and/or butter.), peanut butter, saltine crackers, unsweetened cereal, ramen (both packets and cups). These are our current needs for the hygiene pantry: tissue packets, first-aid travel size kits, sanitizing wipes (travel size or small packets), masks (individually wrapped preferred), lightweight rain ponchos in individual packages, laundry detergent (small size no larger than 10 ounce bottles), and cleaning supplies (small size no larger than 10 ounce bottles). These are Iskashitaa Refugee Network's current needs: bags of onions, garlic potatoes, and apples; cans of tuna and tomatoes; sugar, flour, beans (dry and lentil), cooking oil, white corn flour, and pasta. 32 I Sing the Mighty Power of God



With minimal revision this text brings together six of the eight four-line stanzas in an 18th-century hymn written for children and originally headed "Praise for Creation and Providence." The anonymous German tune provides a fitting sense of breadth and wonder.

The pace and diversity of modern life often hinder us from remaining vulnerable to our emotions and to the humanness of other people. This prayerful text to be open to such joys and pains draws on Ezekiel 11:19 and 36:26 in stanza one and echoes Jeremiah 31:33 in stanza two.

These stanzas are selected from a 20th-century English poetic version of an Irish monastic prayer dating to the 10th century or before. They are set to an Irish folk melody that has proved popular and easily sung despite its lack of repetition and its wide range.
